Dear Friends,

I once visited in the home of a family I knew. While sitting at the kitchen table clutching a cup of coffee, the wife said, "My husband thinks that a clean furnace filter is the cure for any malady. If we hear as much as a sneeze in our house, he disappears into the basement and doesn't come up until there's a new filter protecting his family." I was told that he beat himself up for weeks when their kids had Chicken Pox. He was just sure that the pox situation would never have happened if he had stayed on top of the filter situation. His wife said, "I love the changing of the filter (guard) ceremony. I'm telling you, Richie can deliver one compelling "State of the Filter" address." She started to laugh. The other day one of the kids came in with skinned knees. I teased Richie: "Your son is bleeding. Haven't you changed the furnace filter?"

That visit made me think. When I was a kid, the cure-all was vapo-rub. Remember? If you couldn't slime away your ailment, it probably wasn't curable. A stuffed head, a runny nose, or a little cough was all it took for my parents to be opening the medicine cabinet and reaching for that dark blue glass jar with the white lid. A healthy smattering of that goop was slapped on your chest under your pajamas and you were sent to bed to, "sweat it out." A friend of mine said, "I was greased down so many times growing up I thought my parents had me confused with their 68 Chevy. At least they never tried to change my oil." I'm almost sure that parents thought that with a enough vapo-rub we'd be as good as new. Still, there was something awfully comforting about sliding into bed (and I do mean sliding) with slime oozing out of your pajamas and that smell filling the air. I don't know how I could have felt more protected.

God's Word protects our families that way, spiritually. We should be even more conscientious about protecting our families with the filter of God's Word than we are about protecting them with a furnace filter. Psalm

119:9-11 says, “How can young people keep their way pure? By guarding it according to your word. With my whole heart I seek you; do not let me stray from your commandments. I treasure your word in my heart, so that I may not sin against you.” (NRSV)

God’s Word acts as our sin filter. It helps keep our way pure. What’s more, we can hide it away in our hearts and let it work to make purity a more natural way of life. Soothing vapors working their way into our hearts? Not exactly. But memorizing passages of God’s Word and meditating on them, faithfully and regularly attending worship, and participating in the sacrament of Holy Communion; all make living for Christ happen about as naturally as breathing. We can’t see his Word working on our hearts any more than we can see menthol/eucalyptus vapors. But that doesn’t mean it’s not working. Scripture is good for whatever ails us.

The Psalmist continues later in chapter 119: “Lead me in the path of your commandments, for I delight in it. I find my delight in your commandments, because I love them. I revere your commandments, which I love, and I will meditate on your statutes. Truly I love your commandments more than gold, more than fine gold. Truly I direct my steps by all your precepts; I hate every false way.”

If you find yourself leaning toward sin, head for God’s Word. Remain connected to weekly worship and sharing in the Lord’s Supper. You can depend on it, I assure you. However, if it’s athlete’s foot or ring-around-the-collar, go check your furnace filter.

Please look forward to a monthly installment in our parish newsletter about stewardship. Stewardship should be a way of life for all of us, since we are all called to be responsible stewards of God’s creation. So the decision we have to make is not: will we be stewards. It comes down to whether we are going to be good stewards or poor stewards.

Did you notice the dollar signs (\$) in the title? We hope you did. While it is true that stewardship has to do with all aspects of our lives including our time and our talents, we can’t ignore the fact that stewardship is first and foremost about how we manage our MONEY. Jesus talked about money more than he talked about sin and love. He spoke five times as much about money and people’s assets than he did about prayer. If Jesus felt this strongly about the stewardship of our lives and our money, why would we choose not to talk about it?

So we plan to talk about some aspect of giving every month in this section of the newsletter. And we invite you to check out the related section titled: CHANGING TIMES. It will highlight some current finan-

cial news shared with us from Mr. Tuck Aaker's monthly newsletter to congregations in this synod entitled "Sunshine Stewardship."

## CHANGING TIMES

As we all know, the workplace has “turned upside down” over the past three decades. Fewer and fewer people, even in low paying jobs, are “subordinates.” They are seen today as “associates.” Just a title? I don’t think so. These people must know more about their specific task than their boss does. This changes the approach of the manager because the manager no longer manages people – they lead them! And this change to more independent thinking is also what must take place in our congregations as we thankfully say goodbye to the era of the “Lone Ranger” and hello to teamwork!

- Again for 2001 Lutheran Social Services of America is the U.S.’s largest charity. Lutheran Services of Florida is a member and had total revenues of \$7,655 million and private support of \$1,746 million. They rate near the top of all charities with a 93 rating, fund raising efficiency with a 99 rating and donor efficiency rating of 100! We should be proud of this level of outreach!
- Between 2000-2005, 43 major prescription drugs will lose their patent protection. Total sales of these drugs are \$43 billion. Andrx Corp. of Davie, FL, the fifth largest generic drug producer in the world is gearing up to produce new generics that will sell for as little as 30% of the present prices.
- The largest public company in Florida is again Auto Nation in Ft. Lauderdale. They had revenues of nearly \$20 billion and employ 30,000 people. The largest private company in Florida was Publix Supermarkets with sales of over \$15 billion and 121,500 employees.
- Grandparents are big business in the U.S. There are 70 million grandparents with an average of six grandchildren each and they spend an average of \$500 on each group. 87% buy clothes and 52% help pay for their grandchildren’s education.
- Last year Americans spent \$2.6 billion on birdseed. That’s more than twice as much as they spent on baby food and 2.5 times as much as they spent on food for needy nations.
