### PASTOR'S PAGE

Why do so many people let their dreams die un-lived? The biggest reason, I suppose, is the negative, cynical attitudes of other people. Those other people are not our enemies – instead they are our friends, even family members. Our enemies never bother us all that much. We can usually handle them without too much trouble. But our friends – if they are nay Sayers, constantly punching holes in our dreams with a cynical smile here, a put-down there, a constant stream of negative vibrations – our friends can kill us!

The easiest thing to find on God's earth is someone to tell us all the things we cannot do. Someone will always be eager to point out to you – perhaps merely with a look or a tone of voice – that anything new or daring which you try is hopelessly doomed to failure. Don't listen to them. It's the person who never made \$50,000 a year who will tell you that you can't make \$100,000. It's the college dropout who can explain why you're too dumb to get a degree. It's the person who never ran a business who can best describe the obstacles that make it impossible for you to even get started. The person who never even entered a tournament will most convincingly tell you why you don't have a chance at winning.

I believe in a God of unlimited potential who empowers people to reach their dreams. I also know firsthand the importance of keeping company with other dreamers. And I point to Jesus who walked away from the Pharisees and those who were only demanding and drained him – and spent his time with his disciples, those who would listen to him, and those who would participate in ministry with him. A friend said, "My partner and I struggled to sell our first product. We didn't have any business experience. Others laughed at us and told us to get real jobs. But we stayed dedicated to our dream, gravitated toward other achievers, kept praying daily, and went on to build a successful business."

If you find yourself dreaming but not daring, there's only one thing left after all the arguments are weighed and the costs measured. Do it! Try it! How will you ever know if you can paint that picture, run that business, sell that product, write that book, earn that degree, hold that office, make that speech, win that game, or expand that church – unless you try it?

## HOSPITAL VISITS --- MAYBE NO MORE

A church member phoned a friend and said, "Would you believe my pastor didn't come and visit me at all while I was in the hospital last week?" Because of a new law, it's not the pastor's fault.

On Monday, April 10<sup>th</sup> sweeping changes from the new federal medical privacy law, aimed at better protecting patient health information, went into effect. The rules, adopted from the 1996 Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), were designed to give patients more control over who has access to their medical information and protect the transfer of those records. But this new legislation is far more sweeping. It also drastically limits the access clergy traditionally have had to hospital patients.

Some hospitals are no longer giving clergy a list of newly admitted patients. And if the clergy person phones the hospital to find out if their church member has been hospitalized, unless the individual agrees to permit the hospital to give out that information, the pastor will never be told they are there, and will not be permitted to make that hospital visit. The law explicitly allows patients to tell a hospital not to release their names. That means it would not be provided to their church or even to family members.

Upon admission, patients will be given the option to opt out of the hospital's directory to ensure no one outside the hospital staff that provides them with care, will ever know of their hospital stay. If a patient chooses not to be listed in the directory, hospital personnel will not give out information to telephone callers or visitors, not even to family members.

It will be very important for all clergy to inform their church members that now, more than ever before, **it will be necessary for them to phone the church office and notify their pastor directly** rather than rely on the ability of the clergy to find out about their admission by themselves.

So, the next time you are admitted to the hospital, if you want your pastor as well as your friends and family to be permitted to come and visit you, you are going to need to make that clearly known as you are admitted to the hospital; or it may be a long and lonely hospital stay.

## THE CHANGING TIMES

- Internet delivery of W-2 forms has begun. IRS ran a pilot program where state and local governments posted W-2s on a secure website and E-mailed workers telling them how to access the forms. It is expected to provide a huge postage savings.
- Health care costs continue to rise! About 10% on average. More competition and fatter profits have drawn in more new firms. Specialty clinics, like Mayo, will grow in strength and locations.
- “E-giving” will funnel more money to charities in the next few years. Web sites act as clearing houses, keep lists of charities, verify groups that are “legit” and process on-line donations. This will lower fund raising costs and boost exposure of charitable organizations. This can make corporate giving easier...even automatic matching.
- Busy Grandparents are a growing market 7 million care for grandkids on a regular basis. They spend more on their charges than other grandparents with tour operations designing packages for these groups and toy manufacturers stressing toys with educational value to attract seniors.
- The employment shortage remains critical particularly in nursing where retirements and lack of interest have brought a 10% shortage in staffing that shows no sign of relief as the boomers reach the age of declining health. Other technical areas are way short of staff. The same is true in the ministry where again this
